## **DeSantis Moves to Quell Political Dissent**

Freedom of speech, the linchpin of any democracy, is under attack in Ron DeSantis' Florida. The Governor's Department of Management Services (DMS), which oversees the Capitol complex, has proposed new rules that would empower Capitol Police to remove individuals exercising their first amendment right. Under the rules, protestors can be removed and charged with trespassing if police believe their "displays and sounds are indecent, material arouses prurient interests... or their behavior creates a hazard or disruption to performance of official duties."

On December 1, DMS held a meeting to discuss the proposed rules, and many Floridians – lawyers, ministers, historians, lobbyists, university students, and mothers included – attended and voiced their disgust with this blatant attempt to chill their speech. Questions regarding whether organized advocacy groups would be able to attend press conferences, meet with legislators at their offices and outside the House and Senate chambers, and simply speak during public comment in committee rooms all arose. The goal of Republicans is clear: to create confusion, fear, and silence as they ram their extreme agenda forward.

It is not enough for Florida Republicans to have a gerrymandered supermajority in both the House and

Senate, with which they can do whatever they'd like. Now, they don't even want to hear criticism either. That's not democratic, it's authoritarian. Florida history is replete with its citizens peaceably assembling at the seat of their state government to give voice to the voiceless and to the powerless. Freedom of speech in the halls of our Capitol allowed for citizens to protest against racial segregation in the 1960s, against the dangerous "Stand your Ground" law in 2013, and for substantive gun safety reform in the wake of the Parkland massacre. If anti-speech rules were in place at the time, these protests might not have occurred and might not have led to any change at all. With freedom of speech comes public pressure and accountability. Without that pillar of accountability, government no longer acts in the interests of its people, but in the interests of itself.

Republicans are preparing a vicious assault on our civil rights and liberties as we speak. More anti-LGBTQ policies, further restrictions on abortion, voter suppression laws, and dangerous gun laws are all in the works. Irrespective of the anti-speech rules promulgated by DMS, Floridians will protest – as is their constitutional right. The only question is whether DeSantis will follow through with his authoritarian crackdown.

government is drowned, people drown, as we saw when Katrina battered New Orleans.

They don't care that when government fails to protect the public from rogue actors, people lose their homes and life savings, as we saw when Republicans let the banksters crash the economy in 2008. And Republicans don't care that when sociopaths and incompetents are the gardeners, people are choked, as we saw when the pandemic arrived in 2020.

But then inflation spiked, and Republicans once again seized the opportunity to attack Democrats' stewardship of the economy that they themselves had just trashed. In a gross oversimplification, echoed by the media, they claimed that the ARPA stimulus was responsible for the worst inflation in four decades.

Completely ignored in this analysis was a Perfect Storm consisting of choked supply chains, corporate profiteering, the unexpectedly slow reopening of the service economy, and oil company gouging, not to mention the impact of Russia's invasion of Ukraine.

But when the rankest and grossest of those things was chosen to manage the garden, that personification of pestilence actively sought to rid the garden of anything remedial or healthful.

When that happens, Democrats are summoned to clean up the garden. Perversely, Republicans are still able to benefit because the catastrophes they create are so enormous as to defy quick fixes.

Putting party before people and country, Republicans then kneecap Democrats' rescue efforts. It's not long until the public begins to blame Democrats for the economy wrecked by Republicans. Rinse and repeat.

Only three Republicans voted for the Obama stimulus. It averted another Great Depression, but the recovery was slow and uneven, helping Republicans to flip first the House and then the Senate.

Americans soon forgot that Obama created 11 million jobs while in office or that his signature achievement, the Affordable Care Act, saved tens of thousands of lives every year.

Not until Republicans were finally in a position to repeal the Affordable Care Act did the public begin to appreciate Obama's stewardship of the garden. Obamacare was saved, but a madman was in charge of the garden and a pandemic was coming.

Trump left office with an economy more devastated than the one inherited by Obama, with more than 9 million jobs lost in 2020. And Biden was also faced with the worst public health crisis over in a century.

Once again putting party before people, not a single Republican supported the Biden stimulus. At first that seemed to be a bad bet, since the Biden recovery was the fastest ever recorded. Jobs had returned to pre-pandemic numbers within 6 months, and more than 11 million jobs were added by November 2022.

At worst, stimulus payments played a minor role, and at best they helped ensure there was enough food for everyone in the American garden following the worst economic collapse in nearly a century.

As to the small role played by the stimulus, it's worth reciting FDR's response to Republican accusations *he* had been too generous:

"Better the occasional faults of a government that lives in a spirit of charity than the consistent omissions of a government frozen in the ice of its own indifference."

#### The Republican Jungle Emerges

The only thing that prevented Republicans from duplicating the Red Wave of 2010 was a slow public awakening to the Republican approach to gardening.

Republicans have always been content to starve the garden and ignore the presence of things "rank and gross in nature." But when the rankest and grossest of those things was chosen to manage the garden, that personification of pestilence began ridding the garden of anything remedial or healthful.

Republicans celebrated as he applied pesticide to personal rights protected for a half-century. They were silent as he launched an insurrection and sought to destroy the foundational document that governed the garden. ## Godwin's Law of Nazi Analogies

Long before Twitter, and years before the World Wide Web was launched, local bulletin boards and Usenet groups offered a platform from which people could anonymously demonize others from the safety of their own homes.

A young Texan named Mike Godwin who frequented those online forums became disturbed by the frequency with which debates devolved into name-calling, the ultimate trump card being to label one's opponent a "Nazi" or compare him or her to Hitler. As Godwin later recalled, "I wanted folks who glibly compared someone else to Hitler to think a bit harder about the Holocaust."

"Who Da Cap Fit, Let Them Wear It"

This corollary was tested recently when President Biden likened the philosophy underpinning Trump and his supporters to "semi-fascism."

Republicans were, predictably, outraged, as were the usual suspects in the unhinged media, demanding an apology. The so-called liberal media acquitted itself well, however, concluding that the label fit. See, e.g., Biden Shouldn't Apologize to Republicans, by Charles Blow, in The New York Times; If the semifascist shoe fits, wear it!, by Bill Press, in The Hill; Biden called Trumpism 'semi-fascism.' The term

Does merely adopting Nazi tactics justify the "Nazi" epithet, or must we wait to see what they do if they seize power, as they have tried once already?

Realizing that simply asking or lecturing people to be more thoughtful would be fruitless, he half-seriously proposed the following "law":

As an online discussion continues, the probability of a reference or comparison to Hitler or to Nazis approaches one.

Godwin later <u>allowed</u> that he never intended an "actual law," but rather "a meme or a kind of contagious idea." He wanted "folks who glibly compared someone else to Hitler to think a bit harder about the Holocaust."

Some online forums then introduced a corollary that provided all debate ended once the Nazi analogy was made and the one making it was deemed the loser. As this applied without regard to whether the analogy was appropriate or thoughtfully argued, it actually operated contrary to the intent and spirit of Godwin's Law, namely, to encourage thoughtful debate and call out mindless name-calling.

After Trump announced his candidacy, Godwin published an <u>editorial</u> in *The Washington Post* explaining that, "If you're thoughtful about it and show some real awareness of history, go ahead and refer to Hitler or Nazis when you talk about Trump. Or any other politician."

Let's apply this corollary to other one-word epithets designed to foreclose further discussion, such as fascism/fascist and socialism/socialist.

makes sense, historically, by Federico Finchelstein in *The Washington Post*; Biden's 'soul of the nation' speech and the battle against MAGA 'semi-fascism' in America, by Jason Stanley, NBC.

Indeed, "semi-fascism" falls far short of the mark. Comparing Trump and the Trumpian Republican Party to Hitler and the Nazis is more appropriate and equally defensible.

Like Hitler, Trump was perceived as an object of ridicule and not as a threat to democracy. Both men rose to power on the strength of Big Lies. Both men referred to the media as "the enemy of the people." Hitler called them *Lügenpresse*, which translates as "lying press" or "fake news."

The Biggest of the Big Lies circulated by Donald Trump and his Republican enablers is the claim that the 2020 election was stolen. Fully 147 Republican members of the House and 8 Senators (including the loathsome Rick Scott) voted to not certify an election than had incontrovertibly been won by Joe Biden. Some of them took part in the January 6 insurrection that sought to violently overturn the election results and keep Trump in office.

Trump's Big Lie was built on the Big Lie of "Voter Fraud," one that Republicans have been spewing for decades, long before Trump became a Republican, one that has been thoroughly debunked, time and time again. See The Fraud of Voter Fraud, the

Other Big Lies propounded by Trump are also retreads of longstanding Republican lies, such as claims that immigrants are violent and stealing American jobs or that the sorry state of the uneducated white working class is due to advantages given to Black Americans. In reality, immigrants are taking jobs no American would want (which is why two of Trump's three wives were immigrants) and commit fewer crimes than native-born Americans.

As to jobs, the reality is that workers of all colors have been victims of a half-century-long class warfare led by Republicans and fueled by increased automation, jobs shifted offshore and the destruction of unions. Ronald Reagan told unskilled white workers the Big Lie about "strapping young bucks using food stamps to buy T-bone steaks while you're waiting in line to buy hamburger."

Does merely adopting Nazi tactics justify the "Nazi" epithet, or must we wait to see what they do if they seize power, as they have tried once already? German industrialists and conservatives thought that

they could control Hitler . . . until they learned they couldn't. Republicans are learning the same but have ignored the problem because they place party over country, party over democracy. I repeat, Must we wait to see what Trump and his minions do if they manage to seize power again?
