The media's coverage of President Biden is the principal reason the latest poll shows him behind Donald Trump in five of six critical states.

Mr. Biden inherited the worst economic crisis since the Great Depression and the gravest public health crisis in a century. He got off to the fastest start of any president since F.D.R., <u>creating over</u> six million jobs in his first year and reaching his goal of the <u>vaccination of over 200 million</u> <u>Americans in fewer than 100 days</u>. Yet the bulk of the reporting for most of his presidency since then has involved inflation and his age.

Underreported is the impact of Mr. Biden's other achievements: the <u>largest investment in green</u> <u>energy</u> in American history; a <u>\$1 trillion investment in infrastructure</u>; the first <u>federal gun safety</u> <u>legislation</u> in nearly three decades; and the biggest <u>expansion of veterans' benefits</u> in over three decades.
