Arming Teachers Promotes Gun Sales, Not Safer Schools

In large part as a response to the horrendous tragedy last year in Parkland, the Florida Legislature is plowing ahead with legislation not just allowing, but potentially mandating, teachers carrying guns in school. The original legislation left it to individual school systems to determine whether and how to allow teachers to arm themselves; however, current efforts attempt to remove any input from local school boards. While some teachers would accept the opportunity to be armed, most teachers, parents, and

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It Is Class Warfare, and They've Won

If you complain that the superrich aren't paying their fair share, you're accused of class warfare. Well, it *is* class warfare and it has been going on for decades now.

Even before the recent tax cuts, those in the top thousandth, hundredth, or tenth of a percent were already grossly **undertaxed**, as is evident from the [IRS data](#) for the ten-year period from 2006 to 2015:

Notice that the tax rate *increases as the income decreases*. So that the top 1% are actually being screwed by the top tenth of a percent and the top tenth by the top hundredth, while the top thousandth are screwing everyone.

Consider, also, that the Social Security tax paid by even the poorest of the above folks is a vanishing number, since it is only assessed on the first \$128,400 of income. That means that someone in the top 1% pays 0.61% while someone in the top thousandth ends up paying 0.00595%. Anyone on salary who earns less than \$128,400 pays the full 6.2%.

And that's why Warren Buffet famously claimed that he paid a lower tax rate than his secretary. The average salary of an executive secretary to a CEO is [\\$79,144](#), resulting in an effective tax rate of 16.8%. Add 6.2% and that's a higher tax rate than the top hundredth or top thousandth pays.

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Precinct Management: What Is It and Why Is It important?

In addition to my role as Vice President of the Democratic Club of Delray Beach, I am also one of two “Zone Leaders” with the Palm Beach County Democratic Party, with my region of shared responsibility being the City of Delray Beach and the Town of Gulf Stream. Within these two municipalities, there are 40 electoral “precincts”. A precinct is a contiguous group of streets and residences whose registered voters are assigned to a specific polling location by the county’s Supervisor of Elections. Across these 40 precincts, there are currently 49,095 registered voters, and they are broken down by party as follows: 21,830 Democrats, 12,796 Republicans, 572 members of various “third” parties, and 13,897 voters who are not affiliated with any party (NPAs for short, the majority of whom support Democrats when they vote).

This is where Precinct Management comes into play. In the ideal world, each of the 40 precincts in Zone 8 would be covered by a Precinct Leader (PL). A PL is the Democratic Party’s ambassador to the precinct’s registered Dems. In that role, the PL is there to assist with matters of concern to the voters where information and/or advocacy is needed, and the PL is there to help in the matter of voting during all elections that occur, i.e. primary, municipal, state, national. Help might include education on candidates and issues, enrollment in Florida’s Vote by Mail program, direction on early voting and Election Day polling locations, rides to the polls, etc.

And of course, the PL might also assist with the registering of new voters or necessary changes to a current voter’s information. These and other activities are designed to establish constituency and relation-

In a state like Florida, where major elections are often decided by fractions of a percent, and with Florida’s 29 Electoral Votes being the third highest among the 50 states, Precinct Management plays a pivotal role in fostering Democratic voter turnout.

These numbers might lead one to believe that Delray Beach and Gulf Stream (code named “Zone 8”) are Democratic Party strongholds. And to a certain extent, this is true, with the vast majority of local and state elective offices held by registered Democrats. However, reality suggests otherwise. Zone 8 Democrats have not turned out at the levels needed to adequately support statewide and presidential candidates in the face of the significant advantage that Republicans have in 58 of Florida’s 67 counties (our counties of strength are Miami-Dade, Broward, Palm Beach, Orange (Orlando), Hillsborough (Tampa), Pinellas (St. Pete/Clearwater), Alachua (Gainesville), Duval (Jacksonville) and Leon (Tallahassee)).

In the 2018 midterms, only 60.3% of Zone 8’s registered Dems actually voted (which is ostensibly equal to the Republican turnout of 60.4%). It was in part due to this low turnout that James Bonfiglio (D, Ocean Ridge) lost last year’s election in Florida House District 89 to current Rep. Michael Caruso (R, Delray Beach) by a mere 32 votes.

ships that ultimately yield increased Democratic voter turnout.

In a state like Florida, where major elections are often decided by fractions of a percent, and with Florida’s 29 Electoral Votes being the third highest among the 50 states, Precinct Management plays a pivotal role in fostering Democratic voter turnout. And therefore, Precinct Management can literally decide whether America is condemned to endure four more years of criminal and despotic rule by Donald Trump and the Republican Party.

However, at this time, only 26 of Zone 8’s 40 precincts are covered by a PL. So yes, we are actively searching for new Precinct Leaders who can help us move toward full coverage and increased Democratic turnout in 2020. Imagine the grief of a teacher who accidentally shoots a student or law enforcement that accidentally shoots a teacher (or student). Concerns of accidents are valid. There have been instances where guns were accidentally left in a bathroom or on a desk. Teachers performing their duties are mobile and focused on multiple students, black/white boards, and sometimes leave the classroom. How secure will their weapons be during the school day? Ironically, instituting proper weapon security measures may result in a

more concerned with ensuring their ongoing, large donations from the NRA than keeping our children safe in schools. The NRA's primary mission is to promote and increase gun sales in Florida and across the nation with outright, fervent opposition to even the most reasonable and popular (supported by 80-90% of the American people) safety measures, such as universal background checks and military assault weapons bans. There is one highly noticeable commonality with the scourge of mass shootings, including school shootings, and that is the use of the AR-15, a military style assault weapon with no valid hunting, recreational, or home protection utility.

Parents, teachers, and law enforcement agencies all raise valid serious concerns about arming teachers in schools. First is training. Weapons training, which would of course be secondary to their official duties, can only go so far and would not adequately prepare teachers to act in such an emergency. As someone with 25 years of active military service, including a combat tour during Operation Iraqi Freedom in 2003, I can clearly attest that even the best training is never like the real thing. Parents are right to be concerned that teachers may lack the ability to identify and hit the "bad guy" amidst the chaos of a school shooting. Law enforcement is right to be concerned whether they can immediately identify the "bad guy" with teachers as well as shooters holding and potentially firing weapons. The Parkland shooting was over in under 4 minutes. Would an armed teacher wielding a handgun against a military assault rifle have made much difference?

slower response time by teachers who must react to the stimulus, identify the threat, and retrieve their secured (hopefully) gun. Parents have weighed the difficult question concerning whether to move their children to classes The legislation intentionally omits any provision addressing the right of parents to move their children to classes without armed teachers to avoid the potential for a tragic accident. Insurance companies are contemplating not writing policies to indemnify schools because of their own concerns about the risk of accidental or mistaken action.

No duty is more important duty than keeping our children safe, and no place should be safer than our schools. The NRA and [Republican](#) legislators seem more interested in responding to a shooting whereas parents, teachers, and safety advocates strive to prevent them. Responding is too late as there will often already have been casualties. Prevention avoids casualties and the trauma that follows all survivors for the rest of their lives. The best means of prevention is to remove access to the assailant weapon of choice – military assault rifles. The best means of prevention is to institute an effective universal background check system to keep weapons out of the hands of those who should be disqualified from possessing them. The best means of prevention is to keep weapons out of the hands of those with mental illness that pose any danger. The NRA and their Republican allies are only interested in selling more guns and fighting any attempts to limit access.

Make America Great Again?

This is significant because when Republicans had even greater statehouse gains in 2010 they used them to engage in widespread gerrymandering and voter suppression. That enabled Republicans to retain their House majority in 2012 despite receiving [1 million fewer votes](#) nationally, and to be overrepresented in the House in every subsequent election.

Gerrymandering and voter suppression are not only antithetical to democracy but are anathema to that radical promise of our founding document to create a government that will treat all people as equal and endowed with unalienable rights. And if realizing America's original promise is the ultimate measure of our greatness, the best way to "Make America Great Again" is to consign the Republican Party to the dustbin of history in 2020.
