New Profiles in Courage Confirm The Time for Civil Disobedience Is Now

Florida's government's failure to protect its citizens is evil. Fortunately, we are witnessing acts of civil disobedience that call out to the rest of us.

- In the early morning dark of August 23, dozens of doctors and hospital CEOs from across Palm Beach County rallied to protest people failing to get Covid vaccinations, a result of Donald Trump's early marginalization of the threat to protect his presidency. As the light came up, their bright white coats and blue scrubs were eye-catching, their pleas acute. "We are in a real state of emergency...exhausted and frustrated," because intensive care units are full and clinics and doctors' offices are overwhelmed. It's unusual (and often proscribed) for groups of doctors to speak so forcefully, but they couldn't continue watching people suffer and die unnecessarily.
- In August, ten county school boards, representing more than 52% of the state's school children, defied Governor DeSantis' order to prohibit mask mandates in schools, despite his threats to withhold funding.

"It Don't Mean A Thing if We Don't Win Tomorrow"

It was the fourth game of the 2001 World Series. The Arizona Diamondbacks were ahead 3-1 in the ninth and led the series 2-1. The Yankees were down to their last out when Tino Martinez hit a two-run homer to send the game into extra innings. With two outs in the bottom of the tenth, Derek Jeter hit an opposite field home run to win the game and tie the series, sending the crowd into a frenzy.

Interviewed immediately afterwards in the dugout, with a still-screaming crowd as backdrop, Jeter was asked what he was feeling. Dead-serious, he said, "It don't mean a thing if we don't win tomorrow."

They did, and in dramatic fashion again, with Scott Brosius supplying the two-out home run to send the game into extra innings. It was well after 2 AM when the Yankees won in the bottom of the 12th.

As always, Jeter's eyes were fixed on the prize, even if it ultimately eluded the Yankees when Arizona swept the final two games to win the 2001 Series.

We head into the midterms with our democracy in the same position as the Yankees after game 5. Electing Biden in November 2020 and Warnock and Ossoff in January 2021 kept the bastards at bay but it won't mean a thing unless we hold the House and the Senate next year.

Of course the analogy goes only so far. We are dealing (once again) with saving our democracy and our planet, not winning a sporting event. And we are facing foes far more fearsome and malignant than Randy Johnson and Curt Schilling.

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- His actions, rubber-stamped by his Republicanappointed parrots on the Florida Board of Education, were so immoral, so dismissive of science and common sense, that the educators were called to civil disobedience.
- And Mike Burke, only weeks in his new post as PBC Superintendent of Schools, responded to DeSantis' charge that the mask mandate violated state law saying, "No, it does not."

A parents' lawsuit was pending but waiting wasn't an option. School opened on August 10, and, as of August 20, Florida had more children hospitalized with Covid-19 than any other state, "...averaging 54 new admissions a day over the past week," according to the Centers for Disease Control. Children under 12 aren't even eligible for inoculations.

The protestors won a first step. On August 26, a circuit court judge ruled that school boards have the authority to order mask mandates, although parents can opt out for medical reasons. DeSantis will appeal. Nonetheless, the doctors' and educators' actions should be a North Star, guiding us to refuse subordination to egregiously unjust laws.

Since Trump's fascism took root, Americans have suffered a massive assault on our laws and our traditions, which had been as concretized within the American ethos as firmly as our Constitutional amendments. Trump stirred up the sediment of racial and ethnic superiority and blackened both science and reason in an effort to downplay the virus he feared would mar his presidency. Ironically, he'll be known forever for aiding the death of hundreds of thousands of Americans.

DeSantis, salivating for votes from the Trump base, vowed to brook no resistance. And Florida Education Commissioner Richard Corcoran, DeSantis' alter ego, said "We cannot have government officials pick and choose what laws they want to follow."

Oh yes, we can.

Chapters in America's autobiography jump out: The Boston Tea Party, the Abolitionists and the

thousands of college students who ended the war in Viet Nam. And Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.'s model of non-violent civil disobedience forever changed marginalized people's consciousness of their power.

We'd best draw on it now; the Republicans have already jettisoned basic predicates of American democracy, starting with usurping the powers of the federal and state governments for their own benefit, then violence to subjugate the Constitution. January 6 was only their first salvo.

Right now, the virus precludes the demonstrations and rallies that have been so successful in the past. But there is much that citizens can do.

We can boycott the organizations that donate to the campaigns of DeSantis and Senators Rubio and Scott. Tell them the reason for your boycott. Here are some links:

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Two Takes on Texas

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We need to do a better job of trumpeting the accomplishments of the Biden administration and reminding people of the chaos and destruction that ensues when Republicans reign. Democrats Clean Up Republican Messes and Protect the Public

- Democrats have been cleaning up Republican messes since 1929 (from Hoover's Great Depression through W's Great Recession and Trump's Second Great Depression).
- More jobs were created in the <u>First 100 Days</u> of the Biden administration than in any other administration since records began in 1939.
- In the 7 months after Biden's inauguration, <u>4,454,000 jobs</u> were added (a monthly average of 742,333).
- Second quarter GDP grew at <u>annual rate of 6.5%</u>, eclipsing its pre-pandemic high.
- At least 70% of American adults and 57% of Americans have received <u>at least one dose of vaccine</u>. After resistance, the fear of Delta variant has caused vaccinations to <u>rise in Southern States</u>.
- A record <u>31 million Americans</u> are now insured under the Affordable Care Act.
- Medicaid expansion under the Affordable Care Act saved 19,200 lives in the four-year period 2014-17.

Republicans Crash the Economy and Sacrifice Their Own Voters

- Trump and DeSantis betrayed their constituents. The significantly lower vaccination rates among Republicans, coupled with the fact that the overwhelming majority of those in ICUs with the Delta variant, supports the thesis that their constituents have moved from voting against their economic interest to voting against their very lives.
- Trump presided over the loss of nearly 3 million jobs, the worst record since Herbert Hoover.
- At least <u>2.3 million Americans and 240,000 Floridians</u> lost health insurance during Trump's first three years in office.
- Florida's "broken unemployment system," developed under Rick Scott, caused hundreds of thousands of Floridians, many without savings, to suffer lengthy delays in receipt of benefits. Florida pays one of the lowest levels of benefits in the country, and Scott has been accused by experts of intentionally weakening the system to reduce taxes on employers.
- Although DeSantis complained that the unemployment system he inherited was "designed to fail," he betrayed Florida's unemployed by withdrawing Florida from the supplemental unemployment insurance program enacted by Democrats this spring, causing 116,304 Floridians to lose out on the additional benefits and sacrificing over \$418 million in federal funding that would otherwise be spent on the local economy.
- Thanks to DeSantis, Florida is the coronavirus capital of the country. Florida recorded <u>more coronavirus</u> <u>deaths</u> than California, Texas, New York, and Illinois combined in the week ending July 23. Florida <u>set another record</u> for COVID-19 deaths in the week ending September 4. The 2,345 reported deaths was 36% higher than the previous week and was more deaths than any state has reported in the last 6 months.
- Republican governors including Scott, refused to expand Medicaid under the Affordable Care Act (at virtually no cost to their states), <u>causing 15,000 unnecessary</u>, <u>premature deaths</u> between 2014 and 2017. The number of preventable deaths in Florida amounted to 2,776.

It Is Class Warfare We've Been Losing for a Half-Century

Complaints that multimillionaires and multinationals don't pay their fair share of taxes are met with cries of "socialism" and "class warfare." Of course the socialism is for the obscenely rich, who have been practicing and winning class warfare since 1970, as the chart below makes abundantly clear. Not only has the share of all income going to the bottom 90 percent shrunk dramatically since 1970, but in the top 10%, the higher a taxpayer ranked the more his or her slice of the economic pie grew:

The burgeoning inequality is largely a function of under-taxation of the wealthiest Americans. The top tax bracket under Eisenhower was 91%, dropping to 70% under JFK, 28% under Reagan, and then bouncing between 31% and 39.6% under the next five presidents. After the Trump tax cut, it is 37%.

Further contributing to economic inequality is the favorable treatment afforded dividends and capital gains, which comprise the bulk of income earned by the uber-wealthy but little if any of the income earned by ordinary Americans (who generally don't benefit from tax deductions for yachts and private planes).

In the chart below, the tax rate decreases as the income increases. The top 1% are taxed at a higher rate than the top tenth of a percent, who pay a higher rate than the top hundredth, while the top thousandth pay the lowest rate of all of the megarich.

Indeed, as David Leonhardt <u>reported</u> in *The New York Times*, in 2018 the top 400 taxpayers paid a lower rate than almost anyone else.

This is not altogether surprising. Consider that the Social Security tax of 6.2% is only assessed on the first \$142,800 of income. Workers on salary earning under that cap pay the full 6.2%. Even the "poorest" of those in the above chart pay a small fraction of

that, and the rate paid by the top-thousandth of a percent is a mere 0.00729%, a rounding error. And that's why Warren Buffet famously claimed that he paid a lower tax rate than his secretary.

The average salary of an executive secretary to a CEO is \$83,161, resulting in an effective tax rate of 16.9%. Add 6.2% and that's a higher rate than either the top hundredth or top thousandth of taxpayers pay.

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How I Learned About Civil Disobedience. A Personal Story

"No one is coming to save us. Mass civil disobedience is essential to force a political response."

George Monbiot, columnist, The Guardian

I was struck by Monbiot's provocative essay in The Guardian titled, "Only rebellion will prevent an ecological apocalypse." Substitute America's political apocalypse. We're not going to save ourselves with traditional political weapons. Or with people believing "it can't happen here."

As Monbiot put it, "Underlying these excuses is a deep-rooted belief that if we really are in trouble, someone somewhere will come to our rescue: 'they' won't let it happen. But there is no they, just us."

Just us.

I was a teenager when the country was convulsing with outrage against an ignoble war, and with hatred for those opposing it. "Hey, hey, LBJ, how many kids did you kill today?" "America, love it or leave it."

Introduction to Civil Disobedience. I got my first teaching job near Litchfield County, CT, and bought a magnificent, converted barn built in the 1700s on five acres of meadows and trees. But I really didn't know where I'd landed. I discovered the rich and famous lived in these secluded towns like Roxbury and Washington, in stately, old colonials. When I, rube-like, asked about a carpool to help get my eldest son to school in Kent, I was told to try Rebecca Miller, daughter of the famous playwright, who went to the same school. What had I done?

Chapter One. Fortunately, I met Tom and Candace Powers. Tom was an author and intelligence expert and a joy to talk to. He was working on a story about the Weather Underground, a militant sect of the Students for a Democratic Society (SDS) whose signature tactic was placing bombs in government buildings to protest America's support of the invasion of Laos. On March 6, 1970, three members of the group were killed when the bomb they were assembling exploded, including Diana Oughton. She was 28.

Candace called to tell me Tom won the Pulitzer Prize for National Reporting for his articles about Diana. With my still-inchoate worldview, I asked, does violence have any value? Is there a moral equivalence between the activists' bombs and the cluster bombs our military was dropping?

Chapter Two. Arthur Miller, of Roxbury, had written *The Crucible*, using the Salem witch trials as a metaphor for the Red Scare and the House Un-American Activities Committee. When HUAC subpoenaed him, Miller refused to disclose names of friends who were pro-communism. He was found guilty of contempt and sentenced to a \$500 fine or 30 days in jail. His conviction was later overturned.

William Styron, living not far down the road, wrote *The Confessions of Nat Turner* and *Sophie's Choice*, searing portraits of racism and bigotry and, along with other writers such as James Baldwin, signed a pledge not to pay taxes in opposition to the war. I wondered, did these forms of CD have any effect on the decision makers? There was no way to calculate.

Advanced Civil Disobedience Course. I moved, quit teaching to stay home with my newborn, filed theater reviews while he napped and took him along while I volunteered to work on a school busing project and to help resettle Jewish emigres from Russia. New friends and perspectives, unyielding beliefs that success comes when we must put ourselves in the game and the greater the problem, the greater the personal investment.

King's strategies worked. An organized group exponentially multiplies each individual's strength beyond the laws of mathematics. And critical mass needn't be a huge number. Harvard Kennedy Professor Erica Chenoweth says we need only 3.5 percent of the population to succeed, or about 11.5 million people. "Could you imagine if 11.5 million people — that's about three times the size of the 2017 Women's March — were doing something like mass noncooperation in a sustained way for nine to 18 months? Things would be totally different in this country."

Even in a Lineup of the Loathsome, Rick Scott Stands Out

He has overseen the <u>full inoculation</u> of 81.4% of Americans over 65 years and 62.8% of Americans over 12 years of age, impressive numbers considering the hostility of Republican voters and officials in the South.

Biden engineered passage of The American Rescue Plan without a single Republican vote and is on the verge of signing the bipartisan infrastructure act that eluded Trump. Nor would I rule out passage of the critical "human" infrastructure plan or legislation to redress the dozens of voter suppression bills passed by Republican state legislators who fear nothing so much as democracy.

This is not the record of someone who is suffering from dementia or is otherwise unfit for office.

Indeed, the claim is so ludicrous, so spectacularly stupid that Scott was a serious contender for our **Moron of the Month**. But while Scott may be a reprobate, he is no moron. A moron couldn't have presided over a company that committed what was then the greatest Medicare fraud and walk away with a \$300 million golden parachute. A moron couldn't have implemented an unemployment benefits plan so complicated that people simply gave up applying for unemployment insurance, allowing him to brag about his low unemployment numbers.

Scott is comfortable making a claim only credulous fools and ignoramuses could believe because that is his intended audience. It includes the multiple millions of our fellow citizens who resemble the Brownshirts of the prior century's Twenties. Do not believe "It can't happen here." It *will* happen here unless we hold Congress next year.

Hypocrites, Miscreants, and Morons Unload on Biden

It is agreed that the spike in COVID cases is a major reason the jobs number fell so short of expectations. The principal contributor to the spike is Republican intransigence, leading *New York Times* columnist Jamelle Bouie to ask, <u>Do Republicans Actually Want the Pandemic to End?</u> The question answers itself:

Rather than work with him to vaccinate the country, Biden's Republican opposition has, with only a few exceptions, done everything in its power to politicize vaccination and make refusal to cooperate a test of partisan loyalty. The party is, for all practical purposes, pro-Covid.
